

ORISSA TRIBAL EMPOWERMENT AND LIVEIHOODS PROGRAMME PLUS (OTELP PLUS), Ramanaguda

OTELP PLUS Project was introduced at Ramnaguda Block in the FY 2018-19 for livelihood enhancement and food security of poor tribal households of Ramnaguda Block.

Operational Area- Covers 6 GP such as Parikiti, Gulunthi, Gogupadu, Boothing, Gosei Golumunda, Penkan and includes total 38 villages.

Activities in the FY 2020-21:

Activities include Capacity building including community empowerment and beneficiary skill up-gradation, Livelihoods enhancement through support of IG activities, Wadi Plantation, Construction of community infrastructures, Land & Water Management activities through different schemes like State Plan, DIF and MGNREGA schemes etc. Community needs and vulnerable people were identified and the plans were prepared to support accordingly through available schemes. The detailed scheme wise activity details are given below.

State Plan:

(1) Capacity Building

During the FY 2020-21 total 23 nos. of capacity building programmes were conducted at OTELP PLUS program area of Ramanaguda Block with participation of about 700 participants.

SUSTAINABLE AGRICULTURE PRACTICE FOR 2200 TRIBAL FARMERS

This Project is implemented through support of Centre for World Solidarity (CWS), Secunderabad. The aim of the project is improvement of livelihoods of tribal community through improving their agriculture practices in the form of their capacity building, support of agriculture inputs, support for kitchen gardens, support for nursery development and facilitation to link farmer with convergence activities of Line Departments.

Case Studies

(1) Development of entrepreneurship among tribal women through nursery promotion: Nathama Village in Rayagada Block of Rayagada District is one of the tribal dominated villages where above 90% people belong to tribal community. We observed that the tribal women are laborious but still then remain in poverty due to lack of skills and out knowledge. They are mostly dependent on the monsoon based traditional paddy and ragi cultivation and beyond that period they had no alternate way of livelihoods. After implementation of CWS project, Shakti Organisation of Rayagada have organized capacity building programmes for farmers with special emphasis on empowering women farmer. One SHG named Maa Tarini SHG was supported with polythenes, seeds to develop nursery for entrepreneurship purpose with a plan to develop seedlings with local demand. During the FY 20-21 they were supported to raise 1400 seedlings of drum stick and papaya due to demand of farmers and high nutritional value. Out of which 1300 drumstick seedlings were sold @10/seedling and they got a total of 13000/-. Forty percent of the money they deposited in their saving account and rest sixty percent they have kept to continue the nursery activity. The rest of the seedlings they planted at their back yards in the community. The aim of this support is to encourage women towards entrepreneurship development through group activity and to promote nutritional plants at the back yard to fulfill their nutritional development.

(2) Solving the problem of irrigation:

Irrigation is one of the major factor affecting agriculture activities. Through the CWS project Shakti has tried to solve such problems through identifying resources, uniting the farmers and supporting water lifting devices at community level. Through our Programme we have always tried to support the community for a quantitative outcome rather to support single individual. Through CWS project survey was conducted on irrigation issues, available resources and ayacut area to be irrigated through water lifting devices. Basing on the database 2 nos. of motor pumps has been supported to 2 different villages through formation of farmers groups during the FY 20-21. Now total 11 Hectares of agricultural lands have been irrigated with a benefit to 29 nos. of farmers. They are too much of happy for this support which enables them a step towards sustainable agriculture.

(3) Promotion of kitchen gardens: Fulfilling nutrition of vulnerable tribal people

Obtaining varieties of vegetables from market is not always possible for a vulnerable tribal family. So with a motto of availing nutrition at back yard Shakti has promoted kitchen gardens at 4 villages covering 106 nos. of needy farmers with support of CWS. These farmers were supported with drumstick seedlings, banana suckers, coconut seedling, brinjal seed and ivy gourd stems to develop kitchen gardens at their back yards. Due to regular guidance and follow up the survival rate has been good. Farmers have

been started to harvest ivy gourds from their kitchen gardens which was planted during the month of June 20. We have observed that each farmer is obtaining about 1 Kg of ivy gourd in every 2-3 days and become able to fulfill his own family nourishment. These farmers are going to extend their ivy gourd patches in coming days due to availability of resources with them. Now they are able to fulfill their nutrition from variety of fresh vegetables from their kitchen gardens along with income through selling the surplus.

Special Project for Covid-19 through CWS:

One of the greatest disasters faced by the world during last 100 years is the spread of Covid-19 virus. In Odisha, the virus started expanding its reach by end of March 2020. Despite of several steps taken by Government to aware people via television, radio, newspaper but still then the interior indigenous tribal community remains far away from proper awareness and correct information. In accordance of spreading of pandemic Covid-19 special project was implemented in the programme villages with support of CWS to create awareness among villagers and to provide small needy supports for fighting against corona. It was a timely required project when the pandemic increased its spread and there was a net of panic and fear, a sense of helplessness due to no work and rumors prevails over the fact and correct information among such tribal community. Awareness among public is the strongest weapon to fight against corona.

With support of CWS, Shakti extended its support to reach the remote tribal villages of Rayagada district and could involve 1100 families to get the benefit of this awareness campaign. With due permission from the district administration, Field staff of Shakti were able to conduct awareness campaign against Covid-19 at 14 progamme villages of Tadama and Gajigaon Gram Panchayat of Rayagada Block of Rayagada District such as Nathama, Perigaon, Kolingi, Chintaliguda, Gopalpur, Gadaba, Ropa, Luhakhal, Singiput, Goudakhilum, Chakrapadu, Hirshamayee, Gajigaon, Champikotta.

Activities Undertaken:

- Awareness meetings was conducted in 14 villages on preventive measures of corona with special emphasis on social distancing, use of mask/covering face, hand washing, sanitation with demonstration.
- Training to women was conducted in 14 villages on mask production.


- Production of 1100 mask and distributed household wise to create awareness of need of covering nose and mouth to prevent corona.
- Distribution of Hygiene kit to 1100 families with demonstration of their use.
- Support of Grocery kit including needy commodities like rice (5 Kg), dal (1/2 Kg), potato (1 Kg), onion (1 Kg), oil (1/2 liter), soya chunks (1/2 Kg) to 26 nos. of destitute.
- Flex posted at visible places of programme villages, compulsorily 3 nos. of flex per each village containing social awareness messages on prevention of corona published by Government.



Category of Families covered

In this programme, 89 percent of Scheduled Tribe families, 9 percent Scheduled Caste and 2 percent families belonging to Other Backward Class were covered under different activities, which indicate maximum coverage of tribal families through this programme.






A total of 4700 people were covered under awareness creation and distribution of preventive hygiene kits. 58 people from vulnerable families were given emergency ration to help them till they receive any other support during the lockdown situation.

Major Output of the Activities

Output of training on mask production:

Total 14 women were trained in all 14 Programme villages on production of mask. As a result they involved in production of mask for fulfilling the local requirements. Total 28 girls and women were involved in mask production. These masks were sold among the villagers as a necessary commodity for covering nose and mouth while roaming at outside. The selling was highest up to the 2nd week of May 20 when there was strict patrolling of police on mask wearing and less availability of mask in market. Gradually the selling average decreased due to plenty availability of the mask in market and availability at people. Still then mask production is continuing on demand of villagers because of miserable price. It was a wise step to give training at village level which will be helpful in fulfilling the requirement of villagers forever.

Output of Awareness:

As an output of our awareness it was observed that, people are maintaining social distance especially women when bringing water from common source, people when receiving rations, while attending ceremony. They are using phenyls for cleaning house and latrines, giving importance on hand washing and used to cover nose and mouth when going to outside. A study was conducted to observe the post awareness change among the villagers through questionnaires and physical observation, the details of which given below.






Fig: Maintaining of social distance and covering of face and mouth at MGNREGA work sites

Odisha PVTG Empowerment and Livelihood Improvement Programme

(OPELIP):

The PVTGs are the most disadvantaged even among the Scheduled Tribes in the State. The extreme poverty and malnutrition that characterizes the PVTG population in Odisha is the principal rationale for OPELIP. The livelihoods of PVTGs are overwhelmingly dependent on an ecologically complex natural resource base and they are highly vulnerable to variability in weather and climate shocks. In this context, SHAKTI organization in collaboration with OPELIP (a Government programme of ST & SC Development Department) has initiated the implementation of development activities for empowerment of PVTGs (Lanjia Soura & Dangaria Kandha) residing in Rayagada District in the form of their capacity building, improving their agricultural practices and ensuring their access to health, education, land, forest and other services in coordination of LSDA and DKDA of Puttasingh and Chatikana respectively.

Goal of this project:

Overall goal of this Project is to achieve enhanced living conditions, to reduce poverty of the target group households, enabling improved livelihoods and food and nutrition security primarily for PVTGs households, building the capacity of the target households, Securing entitlements over land and forest, improving agriculture practices for enhanced production, Promoting income-generation, micro-enterprises for alternate livelihoods, ensuring access to education, health and other services and improving community infrastructures. PVTG includes Lanjia Soura of Putasing and Dangaria Kandha of Muniguda Blocks.

Operational Area- Two block Putasing & Muniguda of Rayagada District. Two GP of Putasing such as Sagada, Abada covering 8 revenue villages and 12 hamlet villages and two GP of Muniguda such as Munikhol, Sibapadar covering 56 revenue and 16 hamlet villages.

Objective-

- Build the capacity of the target households
- Secure them their entitlements over land and forests
- Improve their agricultural practices for higher production
- Promote income-generating micro-enterprises as alternate livelihoods
- Ensure access to education, health and other services
- Improve community infrastructure

Major Activities-

Community Empowerment, Natural Resource Management and Livelihood Enhancement, Community Infrastructure and Drudgery Reduction

CSR INTERVENTION:

In view of building a better and sustainable way of life for the weaker sections of the society, SHAKTI has got an opportunity to implement livelihood promotion activities under CSR project of Utkal Alumina, Tikiri, Rayagada. We are involved in following activities.

Janaseba Trust- We have shared professional staffs with Utkal Alumina Janaseba Trust for the implementation of WADI plantation activities in Kashipur Block.

UAIL Farm Based Livelihood- We have shared professional staffs with Utkal Alumina CSR for implementation of farm based livelihood activities at Kashipur Block which include project Samrudhi-2 for seed distribution & enhancement in agriculture activities, project Sugandha for MGNREGA activities & lemon grass cultivation, facilitation of agro-craft producer company.

UAIL Non-Farm Based Livelihood- We have shared professional staffs with Utkal Alumina CSR for implementation of non-farm based livelihood activities at Kashipur Block which includes project Sakshyam for textile unit, initiative to create awareness against early child marriage & to strengthen adolescent girls in the form of project 'Papa ki Pari'.

Senior Citizens' Home

India is the second largest country in population explosion. Large numbers of people over the age of 60 are neglected in their families for getting better hospitality. Most of them are very poor and lives in rural areas. The elderly have little hope of escaping poverty and their situation only becomes worse as they get older and are increasingly plagued by chronic health problems. In majority of families they have to face challenge for maintaining a dignified life. During this stage they have to pass through a mentally distressed condition when neglected by their family members or treated as burden in family or being alone in case of nobody with them.

Aim & Objective:

- To foster the welfare of the aged especially the needy aged, irrespective of caste or creed.
- To create in the younger generation and in society a social awareness about the problems of the elderly in today's Society.
- To create environment for senior citizen where they can live freely with dignity.

Shakti's Effort for Aged Care:

SHAKTI has been working on the issues of senior citizens for the last fifteen years. As a part of its effort for senior citizen, there are two types of initiative focusing on the elderly people in the Rayagada District i.e. Non- institutional care & Institutional Care.

i). Non-Institutional Care:

We have been serving the old age people in need. We are helping them to get old age pensions, legal counseling, and Cataract operations and helping them in enrolling in emergency feeding programme. Field staffs are visiting the elderly person in our operational areas; render counseling to them and their family members. We also provide them psychosocial care. We have conducted 34 meetings to create social awareness about the problems of the elderly people, among the younger generation and in society. A total of 143 elderly persons got our services during last year.

ii). Institutional Care:

Shakti has been running a Senior Citizens Home at Rayagada. The programme is funded by the Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Govt. of India and aims to support the socioeconomic development of disadvantaged older people by providing shelter, food, cloth and health care. Under this programme, the Senior Citizen Home has 25strength for destitute and neglected elderly persons, who have nobody else to take care of them. This is a safe & secure place, where they can freely live with dignity. Senior citizens are supported with Shelter, Food, Cloth, Personal toiletries and Medical care at the Senior Citizen Home regularly.

Health Care:

The Doctor visits the Senior Citizens Home once in a Weak and conducts health check-up. Medicines are provided as per the prescription of Doctor. In case of any serious illness of inmate,

we admit them in the Dist. Hospital. Besides weekly health check up one cataract operation was held at LV Prasad Eye Institute, Rayagada in the FY 20-21 where one of our inmates named Dipai Mandangi aged about 67 got benefitted.

Others Facilities:

Inmates are entertained by the television, Oriya Newspaper, story books, spiritual books provided by SHAKTI. All necessary commodities like hair oil, bathing soap are provided regularly to the inmates. Counseling service to the inmates was done by the counselor on regular basis. Besides this picnic is conducted every year for recreation of the inmates along with they are encouraged for singing and dancing for complete amusement among them.

Participatory Management:

We encouraged the inmates to bring solidarity among themselves through decentralize the responsibility in a participatory management system in day to day activities of Senior Citizens' Home. By the facilitation, they have formed following Groups to co-ordinate and management various responsibility smoothly.

- Subcommittee for Food & Cloth.
- Subcommittee for Yoga (Exercise), Meditation, Prayer & Religious discourse
- Subcommittee for Personal Decorum
- Subcommittee for Health & Personal hygiene
- Subcommittee for Sanitation
- Subcommittee for Social work & Recreation.

Continue assistance to the subcommittee and planning cum-review meeting held in every fortnight, the performance of subcommittee has upgraded.

As the project management team one Superintendent for overall management, one counselor, Midwife-Nurse, one Cook-cum-peon, two nos. of Multi Task Staff and one part time Doctor also a part time Yoga Therapist are looking after the inmates of Senior Citizens Home. Our staffs are trained to be prompt, patient and sympathetic towards the inmates.

EXTRA CURICULAR ACTIVITIES:

- Yoga & Meditation : Inmates are practicing Yoga & Meditation daily under the guidance of our trained Yoga Therapist.
- Evening Walk : Evening Walks are done daily by the inmates under the guidance of the Mid Wife nurse.
- Health & Hygiene : Inmates are cutting their nails every week & Hair once in a month. They are involved in keeping the surroundings clean doing some social work like road cleaning with the guidance of our project Coordinator.
- Observed National Day & festival: Inmates observed Independent Day, Republic Day, and Holi etc to build up nationality & brotherhood relationship.

Impoverished elderly women face a particularly difficult situation, especially those who are widows. Given their low rank in society, their inability to work and they are unable to survive on their own. Similar to Senior Citizens Home with an aim of fostering the welfare of the aged women especially the needy elderly widows, SHAKTI has also managing a Senior Citizens' Home for Elderly Women where 50 needy elderly women are being supported with food, clothes and shelter including regular health check up. Along with the support of basic needs to the inmates, regular yoga, meditation, morning & evening walk, recreation activities in the form of singing, dancing, watching television & video play through LCD Projectors, celebrations of National festivals, memorable days are always organized there to keep them happy and healthy. Emphasis has always been given to offer a happy and dignified life to the inmates at their distressed old age.

Maternity Waiting Home

Goal of this Project is to provide institutional care to pregnant women of remote areas for their safe delivery at Hospital to reduce mother and child mortality.

Reduction in mother and child mortality:-

Institutional care of mother is very much necessary in remote tribal belt areas for safe maternity where majority of the women are illiterate, believing in superstitions and facing hurdles to go to hospital due to communication problem. One maternity waiting home (Maa Gruha) is running by SHAKTI Organization under NRHM Scheme at Kashipur Block of Rayagada District. This

Block of Rayagada District is well known as dominated area of poor rural indigenous tribal mass who believes in traditional superstitions instead of hospital for check up, treatment and delivery. SHAKTI Organization has accepted the challenge in motivating the pregnant women of such villages to stay at Maa Gruha and to ensure their safe delivery at Hospital to reduce mother and child mortality. Pregnant women 10 days before delivery date are invited to stay at Maa Gruha with an escort till their safe delivery. They were served with free lodging, timely nutritious diet, regular health check up, counseling through IEC materials by Lady Health Assistants and assisted by the Maa Gruha staffs in every aspect till their delivery. At Kashipur Block during FY 20-21 total 194 cases admitted at Maa Gruha covering 10 remote GP of Kashipur such as Mandibisi, Godibali, Siripai, Adajore, Sunger, Renga, Talajhiri, Chandragiri, Manusgaon, Maikanch with 16 Sub-centre which include 228 villages. Cases from remotest area where movement of vehicle is difficult and from destitute families are always given more priority to ensure their safe delivery.

Training of Asha workers is too much essential who works as an interface between the community and public health system and plays important role as community level care provider. During FY 20-21 one ASHA Induction Training was conducted for 8 days at the Shakti Rural Development Training Centre (SRDTC) situated at Ramnaguda where total 19 nos. of Asha participated from 5 Blocks of Rayagada District such as Bisamakatak, Padmapur, Gudari, Gunupur, Ramanaguda. Along with food facility the participants were provided travel allowance for participating at the training programme. Both trainer and trainees were also provided with necessary well accommodation facilities at the SRDTC premises. Master Trainers from District Hospital participated as Resource Persons.

Strengthening Capacities and Leadership of EWRS:

This project is supported by the "The Hunger Project, India". The objective of this Project is to empower Elected Women Representatives (EWRs) of Gram Panchayats to meet the development needs of their communities. The programme covers entire Ramnaguda Block. Under this programme 4 nos. of clusters have been formed taking women PRI members like Ward member, Sarapanch, Naib Sarapanch at Parikhiti, Ukumba and Kujendri & Gpgupadu. One Mahasangha named Aliva Mahasangha have been formed including the women PRI members. Programmes related to meetings, workshops, trainings, campaign have been conducted for capacity building of the women PRI members for active participation in the PRI system. The details of the activities conducted during 2020-21 under this project are listed below.

Details of Campaign on food security:

With a preparatory meeting plan was prepared through preparation of route maps and assignment of responsibilities to the volunteers for movement of food campaign chariot throughout Ramanaguda Block. Accordingly the food security campaign was conducted for seven days in entire Ramanaguda Block from Dt. 15.12.2020 to 21.12.2020. During that period a decorated van with messages on food security campaign was moved throughout the Block including all GP of Ramanaguda. The Journey of the campaign started on Dt. 15.12.2020 from Block Office, Ramanaguda inaugurated by Block Chairman Mrs. Rajani Mandangi and BDO, Ramanaguda, Mr. Benudhar Sabar in the presence of CDPO, Mrs. Shantilata Ratha, Anganwadi Supervisors Mrs. Subuddhi Sabar, Mrs. Padmini Kumbhara and other Block officials. During the campaign period 106 nos. of villages were covered with 20 nos. of community demo meetings conducted at 20 different villages to aware people on different food security schemes. Total 334 participants participated in the demo meetings conducted at village level. Out of total participant female and ST participants were much more in comparison to other categories which shows that majority of

the participants were tribal women. EWRs and EMRs cooperated at their concerned areas with active participation in the campaign.


Topics related to Food Security Schemes of Govt. including PDS, locally available nutritious foods & preservation of traditional foods, Nutritional requirement of mother and child including schemes of ICDS for nutrition, benefit of MGNREGA scheme and requirement of kitchen gardens were discussed vividly in the meetings with a participatory method for active participation of the participants. Discussion was also done on "Mo Upakari Bagicha" scheme of Odisha State Govt. implemented by Odisha Livelihoods Mission (OLM) meant for active involvement of women in formation of nutritious gardens at their back yards with vegetables, greens and fruits for self consumption and selling of surplus. Emphasis was given to eradicate malnutrition and anemia which are most commonly seen in tribal belts due to superstitions and restrictions on diet of pregnant mothers, lack of nutritious diet for children due to poverty and unawareness of available schemes. The importance of nutrition for children, adolescent girls, women during pregnancy, breast feeding mothers was discussed during the whole campaign period. IEC materials like flex banners, posters and leaflets were used during interactions for better impact on community. Besides this sample of nutritious foods were exhibited in the meetings and campaign.



Coverage of Community Demonstration Meetings:

The overall campaign had positive impact over the communities as majority of the communities belong to tribal who still believe superstitions, social taboos and unaware of Govt. facilities. "People will be aware on provisions of Govt. schemes meant for Food Securities", said Mr. Benudhara Sabar, BDO, Ramanaguda during his inauguration speech. "People will be more aware of the ICDS provisions for pregnant mothers, children on nutrition" said Mrs. Shantilata Ratha, CDPO, Ramanaguda. EWR cum Sarapancha of Haduguda said that, "movement of the chariot with social messages on food security will impact people to create nutritious gardens at their back yards and they must now give priority on sufficient nutrition to pregnant and lactating mothers, children and adolescent girls". AWW of Sundhidhamuni Mrs. Sukanti Swain said that "this campaign will be helpful for eradicating anemia and malnutrition most commonly seen in tribal population due to unawareness". Mrs. Jayanti Kadraka one of the villagers of Taski Village said that, "We got to know so many things on nutritious foods available in markets instead of preferring vegetables and fruits available in our back yards, we were also well informed on available Govt. schemes meant for us".

In this way the seven days food campaign came to end with community participation and support throughout the journey.

Details of Relief for Covid 19:

One of the greatest disasters faced by the world during last 100 years is the spread of Covid-19 virus. In Odisha, the virus started expanding its reach by end of March 2020. Despite of several steps taken by Government to aware people via television, radio, newspaper but still then the interior indigenous tribal community remains far away from proper awareness and correct information. In accordance of spreading of pandemic Covid-19, Relief programme was implemented in the project villages with support of THP to support vulnerable families at their need situation. It was a timely required project when the pandemic increased its spread and there was a net of panic and fear, a sense of helplessness due to no work and rumors prevails over the fact and correct information among such tribal community. Standing with the communities during this critical period with their elected representatives is like panacea to them.

Total 300 vulnerable families were identified from 60 villages covering 12 Gram Panchayats of Ramanaguda Block such as Gulunthi, Parikhiti,Gogupadu, Gulumunda, Sundhi dhamuni, Kujendri, Ukumba, Bhamini, Gosein gulumunda, Boothing, Penkam and Nilamguda. The economic category and vulnerability of the individuals taken in to consideration for their selection and that include BPL category, Landless, Old Age, Single women, Transgender and Differently able. Emphasis was given to cover vulnerable single member families. **Detailed list of supported vulnerable families:**




Coverage of Social Category as per Caste-


Coverage of Social Category as per vulnerability-


Gram Panchayat wise coverage of the Relief-

The Relief Programme was conducted in 12 GPs of Ramanaguda. Out of 12 GP, highest no. of vulnerable families identified at Kujendri GP including 5 villages and lowest no. of vulnerable families identified at Ukumba GP including 3 villages. Total 60 villages were covered with 300 numbers of families including 366 numbers of people. Emphasis was given for support of the single member families with most vulnerable condition. Highest no. of villages covered in Gulunthi GP where as lowest no. of villages covered in Penkam GP. Highest no. of people covered in Kujendri GP where as lowest no. of people covered in Ukumba GP. The detailed GP wise coverage of the relief programme is given in below chart.




Gender wise Coverage of the Relief-

Case Study:

Blessing of a Deprived:

Sulu Mandangi who is a resident of Gogupadu village of Gogupadu GP was born with misfortune as he has lost his parents in childhood. Throughout his life he has struggled for survival. But now at the age of 75 he has no strength to struggle more. He is a person with no home, no asset and living at a broken house of old Panchayat depending on the old age pension Rs. 700/- and 5 Kg of rice per month, sometimes offering of the kind hearted villagers. Still then he is living with his self respect as no one has seen him begging or requesting anyone for assistance. During the spread of pandemic Covid 19 the as usual life of community has been affected due to lock down declaration of Govt. and prohibition on normal movement of people to check community level spread. Sulu Mandangi was also one of the sufferers of this critical situation. He was selected by ward member of Gogupadu Mrs. Minu Araka for getting the assistance of Covid 19 relief supported by The Hunger Project, India and facilitated by Shakti Organisation, Rayagada in coordination of Alibha Federation, Ramanaguda. After getting the ration kit including detergent, soaps and mask he was too happy as he received the essential commodities at his village residence without going to anywhere, without standing in any queue and without requesting to anyone. He uttered blessings for such kind of support.

CHILDLINE, RAYAGADA:-

The CHILDLINE is 24 hours (night & day) free phone outreach service, which can be accessed by a child in distress or anybody on behalf of child can dial the number 1098 on telephone. CHILDLINE provides emergency assistance to a child as soon as possible based on child's need.



The CHILDLINE service focuses on the needs of children living alone on the

streets, child laborers working in unorganized sector, domestic workers and sexually abused children. The child is rescued & referred to an appropriate organization for long-term follow up and care. Main objective of the Programme is to contribute and work towards strengthening and participating in a global movement that addresses issues related to child protection and ensures that children's voices are heard.

Activities:-

- Responding to calls on the national toll free number 1098 and provision to rescue and offer emergency outreach services for children in need of care and protection.
- Coordinating rescue and other outreach services with the help of relevant local departments like police, administration, labour, health, railways and others.
- Ensuring proper documentation of all children rescued to facilitate their rehabilitation and restoration, where necessary.

- Producing children before the Child Welfare Committee (CWC) to ensure care and protection and supporting the CWC in the long-term rehabilitation of children, where required.
- Providing data related to children rescued and rehabilitated for the compilation of a national comprehensive database of child protection.
- Creating awareness and ensuring access to the 1098 Child helpline (CHILDLINE) number.
- Conduction of extracurricular activities like rangoli, drawing, dance competition among students for improvement of skills.

Case Study:

Solving the Child Marriage Issue:

Background of the Child:

In spite of awareness through Government, early marriage is common and acceptable among tribal community residing in remote areas. It was observed that ignorance about law, sexual desire among teen agers, lack of knowledge on bad effect of early marriage on children and illiteracy of parents are the main reason of such cases. On date 21.07.20 the childline team, Rayagada was informed regarding an elopement case by CDPO, Rayagada where one teen aged girl of class- VIII started living with another teen aged boy of class- XII at Handipai, Po-Gajigaon, Ps-Hat Sesakhal, Block/Dist-Rayagada. The girl belonged to village Pendili, Po/Gp-Kumbhikota, Ps/Block/Dist-Rayagada.

CHILDLINE intervention:

The incident happened due to teen aged affair between them and no restriction in the illiterate families. Both the families settled the matter through their traditional culture of acceptance of the girl by giving bride price to the girl's family. But they were not worried regarding the bad effect of such early marriage on their children. Though the Anganwadi worker intervened the case but they did not listen to her and therefore she informed CDPO. After getting the information from CDPO, Childline team, Rayagada rescued the girl to swadhar greh



with coordination of ICDS CDPO, Aww, Seskhal police, District consultant of child marriage prohibition officer and counseled the guardians, counseled the girl and the boy regarding law, right age for marriage and bad effect of early marriage on them. Followed by proper counseling the girl agreed to return her home to continue her study and to wait for the right age for marriage.

CHILDLINE Impact:

After intervention of Childline, counseling conducted for the children and parents followed by rescue of the girl who was produced before CWC- Rayagada for arrangement of immediate shelter to the child because of need of care and protection. Finally the early marriage was prohibited and the girl is now continuing her study with a normal life. In this case two teen aged

students returned back to their as usual life towards a safe future from committing a mistake through the steps taken at right moment.

Community Forest Right

The objective of this project is to fight for the rights of indigenous community over forest land they are dwelling year after year from their ancestors.

Achievement during FY 2020-21:

Total 68 nos. of community forest right claims were submitted from 68 villages covering 6 GPs and 3 nos. of Blocks of Rayagada District such as Gunupur, Kolnara and Ramanaguda Blocks. The details of Block wise CFR claim submission status is given in below table.

Secondary Hostel for SC Boys


One 100 seated Hostel for the Scheduled Caste boys of secondary classes is functioning at Rayagada where 100 nos. of students got admitted during the FY 2020-21. Facilities like lodging, food, tuition through part time teachers, uniform, regular health checkups are available for admitted students in free of cost. Marginal and deprived SC students were identified for taking admission in to the Hostel and to take benefit of the facilities. During the FY 2020-21 the hostel remained closed for the periods as ordered by Govt. on account of spread of Covid-19 and as preventive measures for students remained open for the period as per Govt. order and guideline.

Research Study on Traditional Pandal Cultivation


